Another Exhibition of local interest entering ending 7 October at Heide presents a broad collection of Vasillieff's paintings and sculptures, including lots we had not seen before. Many of you will have visited us at Stonygrad over the years which plays a significant part in the exhibition.



You may have seen or heard about "Be Ready Warrandyte" and wondered what it is all about. It is a call to action to the Warrandyte community and our neighbours to be informed, supported and well prepared for our everyday reality of living with bushfire risk.

The "Be Ready Warrandyte" project is a Warrandyte Community Association initiative and has a very clear purpose - to increase the number of local households with a current and practiced Bushfire Survival Plan.

The first task of the project is to find out how many households have a fire plan and to what level of detail. The survey will also determine what the barriers are to bushfire planning and how the community would like to find out more to help them develop an effective Bushfire Survival Plan. This is being done by conducting a survey.

I am asking you to take around 15 minutes to complete this survey online - www.warrandyte.org.au - and be part of this community's collective, smart and local response to bushfire. (Only one survey per household and to be completed by someone aged 18 or over).
